THE SCENARIO



Latisha is the first person in her family to go to college. She met Zane during New Roo Weekend and immediately became friends with him. They study together and have lunch sometimes. During the third week of the program, Zane asked Latisha out on a date. Latisha said no and that she just wanted to be friends. At first Zane seemed okay, but then asked her again the next day. Latisha again said no. Zane then spent the next few days constantly texting Latisha about going out. Latisha decided to stop interacting with Zane all together, hoping he would stop; however, he did not. You're Latisha's RA. She comes to you because she does not necessarily want to get Zane in trouble, just to leave her alone.



STEP 1 - HOW DO YOU RESPOND?

- How might Latisha be feeling?
- How might you be feeling?
- Tips for Responding
 - Focus on Latisha
 - Listen without judgment.
 - Offer support
 - Thank you for telling me. That must have been a difficult situation.
 - That is a lot to go through. Let's talk through some options for next steps.
 - Don't pry or try to investigate.
- What could be a way to start the conversation with Latisha?

STEP 3 — REPORTING OBLIGATIONS

- Why do we have reporting obligations?
- Informing Latisha of your reporting obligations
 - As soon as prudent, inform Latisha that your conversation is private but cannot be kept confidential (only those who need to know will know).
 - Let her know you will need to contact the appropriate Deputy Title IX coordinator to ensure the best possible University response.
 - After the report, someone will contact Latisha to talk through options
 with her. She is not required to speak with them but doing so can help
 connect Latisha to resources and processes to address her concerns.



STEP 4 — NAVIGATING THE REPORT

- Reports must be filed with the Title IX Coordinator.
- Your supervisor can help you navigate this process, but it is your responsibility to complete the report.




